MAYOR'S COLUMN

May Council Ordinary Meeting Outcomes:

Biosecurity: Chose to make a submission on the draft Biosecurity Bill noting that the Bill should include the requirement that there be a fulltime biosecurity presence on both Flinders and King Islands as they are significant gateways to the State.

Dog Fees: Kept the 2017/18 year dog fees the same as for the 2016/17 year with a discount for early payment. Thus payment of 2017/18 dog registrations prior to the 30th June 2017 will attract a \$15 discount.

Council is moving to the use of lifetime tags, that is each dog will be issued with a tag and number that will only change if the tag has to be replaced due to loss or damage.

Policies: Noted that the Land Transfer, Aboriginal Reconciliation and Tasmanian Tidy Towns policies, after being available for public consultation with no submissions received, were rescinded and no longer apply.

The Credit Card Policy was approved for public comment over a 28 day period, noting that the procedures to accompany the policy will be considered at the June Ordinary Meeting of Council.

Community Grants: Approved the following grants totalling \$7,955 to support community organisations:

- Flinders Island Show Society: \$2,000 for entertainment for the 2017 show and facility hire and licence fees.
- Lions Club of Flinders Island: \$1,500 to purchase a heat pump for the Lions Lodge Building, Whitemark.
- Furneaux Group CWA: \$1,155 to purchase a sliding glass door for the Patrick St side of the rest rooms, Whitemark.
- Friends of Bass Strait Islands: \$1,500 to help with the costs associated with bringing volunteers to the Furneaux Islands.
- Furneaux Field & Game Association Inc.: \$800 to purchase sashes for the Furneaux Super Shoot and Tasmanian Championships.
- Furneaux Islands Motocross Association: \$1,000 to assist with machinery hire to maintain the track and financial assistance to cover permits, club affiliation and insurance.

Gunn Bequest Grants:

These grants are made from the interest income from a bequest left by Jack and Enid

Gunn in 1984 for sports related purposes. By only expending 50% of the interest annually Council has maintained the real value of the bequest with the principal now totalling \$109,339. For the 17/18 financial year Council is expending greater than 50% of the interest for community benefit allocating \$2,491.94 of the \$3,000 interest available to the following:

- Flinders Island Pony and Riding Club: \$370 to assist with airfares from Launceston to Flinders Island for an instructor.
- Flinders Island Harriers Inc.: \$750 for financial assistance in using race tie contactors from Oztiming for the Flinders Island Running Festival.
- Flinders Island Netball Association: \$329.94 to purchase new netball bibs and balls.
- Flinders Island Netball Group: \$370 to assist with airfares for team, coaches and players for clinics and umpires for games in September.
- Flinders Island Golf Club: \$500 to assist with the purchase of a Husqvarna mower.
- Furneaux Field & Game Association Inc.: \$172 to purchase 2nd and 3rd place medallions for the Furneaux Super Shoot and Tasmanian Championships.

Federal Budget:

The outcomes that will or could have an impact on Flinders Council are:

- The Federal Assistance Grants (FAGS) indexation freeze has been lifted.
- The Federal Government has also decided to pay 50% of the 2017/18 year FAGS grants to Councils in this, the 2016/17 financial year. Whilst this puts cash in Council's bank account early, it complicates the budgeting process and last time it occurred the prepayment arrived in Council's bank account on the 30th of June of the year it was being prepaid in.
- A new \$472 million Regional Growth Fund for regional infrastructure and community projects, including a further \$200 million for the Building Better Regions Fund.
- Funding of Roads to Recovery (R2R) through to 2020-21 and will be \$400 million per year from 2019-20.

Biosecurity:

A link to the Tasmanian Biosecurity website has been added to the Flinders Council website. The responsibility for biosecurity is being shifted back to the individual and I ask that all residents and visitors take care to follow the biosecurity rules for Tasmania.

DOGS

Dog owners are reminded that dog registration is due to expire on 1 July 2017.

Council will allow for discounted payments to be made prior to expiration of registration. The discount period will run from 1 June until 30 June inclusive.

This year you will receive a black tag without a registration year noted on it. This tag will be known as a "tag for life". Your dog will be assigned the number on the black tag. Every year that you re-register your dog you will use the same number and not receive a new tag. If the tag becomes lost or broken you can replace the tag and receive a new perpetual number for your dog's registration.

Remember that all dogs over the age of 6 months must be registered. If your dog doesn't always live here, or is new from another municipality, you are not required to register with Flinders Council, however the dog must be registered in a Tasmanian Municipality at all times.

Please ensure that your dog wears its tag at all times and is always under your effective control when out.
