#### **Recreational and Community Facilities** Audit

Council has recognised that many of our recreational and community facilities require upgrades or significant works. The questions are -on what facilities do we expend funds, what for and for how much? Council is Community developing а Asset Management Plan that puts all the information on community facilities in one place, including their physical state and current and prospective uses.

The plan will provide an assessment of the overall condition of Council-owned community infrastructure available for public use such as halls, parks, toilets, barbeque facilities, the showgrounds and boat ramps. Existing usage levels and some demographic profiling on projected future uses and needs will also be collated, allowing for recommendations for future maintenance, upgrade and/or investment requirements.

In the last few months Council staff have been working to prepare this detailed assessment of the recreational and community facilities and draft a community infrastructure plan for Council's consideration. I understand a number of you will have already spoken with Jana Harper and/or Tim Phillips (Consultant) about the project and facilities in your area.

Preliminary findings were presented to Council at the last workshop and the draft report will be considered at the April Ordinary Meeting of Council. Once received, the draft report will then be put out to the community for further feedback and input prior to being further considered by Council. I encourage you to get involved and help shape the final report and plan. This will be a "living" report with regular reviews as the facilities and infrastructure needs of our community change over time.

### Australia Post

As many business have, I also have received written advice of changes to business postage rates from the  $2^{nd}$  of June 2014, and more importantly, that the cost of postage stamps will rise by 10 cents to 70 cents from the  $31^{st}$  of March 2014.

### Unsealed Roads New Speed Limit – 80 km/hr

Thank you to Sergeant Russell Judges for alerting the community to the change of speed limit in the last Island News. I remind all that the State Government introduced the speed limit on unsealed roads in Tasmania from the 1<sup>st</sup> of February 2014. The new limit is 80km/h unless otherwise sign posted.

Flinders has a total of 74% unsealed roads and I am disappointed that the introduction of the reduced limit was not widely broadcast in this community by the Government. Signs have been requested to advise interstate visitors of the speed limit.

#### Expressions of Interest – Hospitality, Guiding and Event Management Training Comes to Flinders!

TAFE Drysdale is exploring the possibilities of delivering two programs on Flinders Island in 2014.

The first is for existing workers in the hospitality industry. The program will be heavily subsidised by Skills Tasmania and is aimed at existing workers requiring further training, and recognition of existing skills. Units on offer could be: Customer Service, Food and Beverage Service, Café Skills, Barista, Accommodation Services and Guiding.

This program requires part payment by employers or employees.

The second program would be a fee free program delivered over 6 months with visits from Drysdale teachers on a monthly basis. This would include units from; Food and beverage, Guiding and interpretation, Basic cookery skills, Event management and Tourism. This project will culminate in an "Event on the Island". Age is no barrier. This program will explore what is special on the Island and look at "Eco tourism, Food Tourism, Experiential tourism" guiding participants the to find

gaps...explore possibilities for future tourism ventures and experiences. This will be hands on program with assessment through participation.

Both programs will work collaboratively with the Council, FITA, business operators and residents of the Island. ### GRANTS

There are currently a variety grants available that may be applicable to local community groups and organisations. Below are a list of the grants and their links for you to have a look at. If you have an idea or project we suggest you contact the funding body to discuss your eligibility and application.

## **1. Aboriginal Benefits Foundation** www.aboriginal.org.au/grants

Grant Applications are considered by the board of the foundation at each directors meeting. The board currently meets approximately 6-8 times per year.

2. First Home Owners Grant (FHOG) and First Home Builder Boost (FHBB) www.sro.tas.gov.au Applicants can receive \$7,000 for the FHOG for a new or established dwelling including a house, flat, unit, townhouse or apartment anywhere in Tasmania that meets local planning standards. The existing \$8,000 First Home Builder Boost (the Boost) has been increased to \$23,000. The new Boost applies to eligible applicants with contracts entered into between these dates 7 November 2013 and 31 December 2014.

## 3. Arts Tasmania Offers Funding Programs <u>www.arts.tas.gov.au</u>

There are a range of grant opportunities available through Arts Tasmania at different times throughout the year.

## **4. 26 TEN Grants Program www.skills.tas.gov.au**

The Program supports employers and peak bodies to increase the literacy and numeracy skills of Tasmanian workers (paid and voluntary). Applicants can apply for a grant of up to \$50,000. There are two levels of funding: Tier 1 \$5,000 - \$20,000 and Tier 2 \$20,001 - \$50,000. Applications for 2013/2014 funding round are open and closes on 27<sup>th</sup> March 2014.

### 5. Tasmanian Jobs and Growth Plan www.investment.infrastructure.gov.au

The Australian Government has announced \$106 million in funding for the Tasmanian Jobs and Growth Plan, for projects which support the economic development of Tasmania. The Tasmanian Jobs and Growth Plan is an initiative which complements the Government's *Economic Growth Plan for Tasmania*—a package of measures aimed at stimulating Tasmania's economy by supporting growth and employment.

## 6. Rural Education Australia Program - REAPing Rewards <u>www.frrr.org.au</u>

The REAPing Rewards small grant program is a national program targeting education. It supports locally-driven projects and programs that directly benefit children and youth (0-18 years) and their educators in rural and remote communities. Grants are up to \$10,000. Closes 21<sup>st</sup> March 2014

### 7. Farm Finance Concessional Loans Scheme (Tasmania)

The Australian Government will provide \$15 million per year (a total of \$30 million over two years from 2013-14) for the provision of Concessional Loans to eligible farm businesses in Tasmania for productivity enhancement or debt restructuring purposes. Tasmania, the Concessional Loans In Scheme assist will farm businesses experiencing debt-servicing difficulties but considered potentially viable in the longer term.

### 8. NRMA Community Grants www.communitygrantsprogram.com.au

The NRMA Insurance Community Grants Program supports this by providing grants of up to \$5,000 to community projects in the areas of crime prevention, road safety, emergency readiness and response and the environment. Closes 31 March 2014

### 9. The Tasmanian Community Fund (TCF) <u>www.tascomfund.org</u>

The latest general grant round opened on 8 February 2014. A wide range of projects which support children and young people; community wellbeing and life skills; community participation and recreation; connecting communities; and culture, arts and heritage are eligible to be funded by notfor-profit organisations proposing to undertake project а in Tasmania. Expressions of interest for large grants close on 12 March 2014. Applications for small grants close on 2 April 2014 and applications for medium grants close on 16 April 2014.

# **10. Grants for Rural Communities** www.frrr.org.au

The program offers at least \$400,000 per round in grants up to \$5,000 for projects and activities that offer clear public benefit for communities, with populations of 10,000 or less, living in small rural and remote locations in Australia, contributing to their development in social and community. Closes 28 March 2014

The Australian Disability and Indigenous Peoples' Education Fund (ADIPEF) will assist indigenous and non-indigenous people with disability to participate in both formal and informal education programs through small grants. Closes 31<sup>st</sup> March 2014
