IN THE LAST ISLAND NEWS

Someone suggested that the best and most obvious solution to the Island's "antiquated waste system" was for Council to purchase a compacting waste collection truck so that waste can be collected from homes. This idea was thought of a few years ago. But when it came to be explored it turned out to be an impractical solution to our waste disposal issues.

COUNCIL AIMS TO DO BETTER THAN THAT

If in fact all waste was compacted together, it would all have to go to landfill. We are aiming to have much less go to landfill in the future. Landfill can only continue if a lined cell is used. If all waste is put into the cell, even if it is compacted, the cell would fill very quickly. New cells would have to be purchased within a short time span. This would be very costly – for Council and thus for ratepayers. We want to put as little in the cell as possible so that each cell can last a good number of years.

LET'S HEAD TOWARDS A CIRCULAR ECONOMY

A circular economy is one in which there is as little waste thrown into landfill as possible. One person's waste can become another person's treasure. We have plans to start with a small number of sorted waste streams – but they will just be the beginning.

Possibilities could include:

- Reuse, recycle, repair, rebuild.
- Green waste could become compost and mulch to be reused in gardens and farms.
- Cardboard and paper can be stored and then shipped to businesses that recycle it – even pay for it!
- All manner of other items can be collected and sent off for recycling, e.g.: the clips from bread packets; all sizes of batteries; oil; printer cartridges; aluminium cans; etc

- Keen, innovative islanders could start small successful businesses based on other people's waste: e.g. spare parts; a proper tip shop or op shop; compost and mulch. Who knows?
- Give it some thought. Who knows what good ideas people may come up with!

KEEP YOUR EYES AND EARS OPEN FOR THE SEASIDE SCAVENGE!

Connor and Aimee Wheatley have had a great idea. The date is still to be decided – probably late Spring or early summer. They are going to organise a 'Seaside Scavenge'.
