



NOTES FROM THE MAYOR

WHAT WILL THE OUTCOME BE?

I am pleased to say that Flinders is close, hopefully, to gaining approximately \$5 million now that the Liberal Government has been returned. My understanding is that the commitment depends on their having a majority government. Below is a summary of the potential gains.

- \$350,000 over four years to strengthen biosecurity on Flinders Island – this would mean we could have two full time bio-security employees.
- \$900,000 upgrade for camping and RV access, and replacement of the stairs at Trousers Point Beach – this funding is for Parks & Wildlife.
- \$2 million to commence the staged sealing of priority sections of Palana Road – Michael Ferguson has also committed to continuing to work on the resealing of the whole of Palana Road into the future. This funding would be a great start.
- \$980,000 towards new veterinarian facilities and equipment to help attract a veterinarian to Flinders Island – this was one of Council's priority projects. We currently do not have proper vet facilities on the Island. John O'Dell currently provides vet services in his own time from Bio-security-owned premises. This funding would be such a relief for pet and livestock owners on the Island.
- \$200,000 for upgraded health equipment at the Flinders Island Multi-Purpose Centre – the MPC, in collaboration with the Department of Health, will work out the detail of this.

- \$120,000 to upgrade existing boat ramps on Flinders Island – I have set a date to meet with the boating community to discuss boat ramps on the Island.
- \$39,400 to the Furneaux Island Community Shed for maintenance, including a dust extraction system, fencing, a portico and new equipment. The new Community Shed is nearing completion. The Shed is important to many and the funding could purchase the equipment that the volunteers need to continue this valuable project.
- \$60,000 to the Flinders Island Sports and RSL Club towards new toilet and shower facilities. This is another step towards the Club's aim to create a Sports Hub that all Islanders can access easily.
- Extend direct underwritten flights between Hobart and Flinders Island until the end of March 2022, bringing thousands of dollars of economic benefit to the Island, as well as providing better options for locals to access Hobart.
- \$300,000 for a community-centred project that could create a visitor-economy based on Islander values.

BOATING COMMUNITY FORUM

I have organised a forum on Wednesday 26th May in the Carpet Room at the FAEC, 5.30 pm. The objectives of the meeting are as follows:

- To enable boat owners to understand how Council intends to address the issue of boat ramps;
- To set up a process and procedure for future boat ramp building;
- To begin a discussion about current boat ramp needs.
- Discuss potential government funding to Council of \$120,000 for maintenance / building of boat ramp/s.

CAT MANAGEMENT ON THE ISLAND

At the April Ordinary Council Meeting, Council endorsed the Northern Tasmanian Cat Management Strategy. Action on this will depend on whether cat management features in Council's Annual Plan for 2021/22. The Annual Plan, based on our new Strategy Plan,

will be drafted in the next 6 weeks or so. But it is positive that the strategy has been endorsed.

FLINDERS DESTINATION ACTION PLAN

The Flinders Destination Action Plan (DAP) was an outcome of the Hodgman State Government in 2016. The DAP Plan has now been reviewed by the Flinders Island Business Incorporated and the Flinders Council, working collaboratively. One of the main objectives of the revised DAP is to explore how the Flinders visitor economy can achieve improved balance. In the lead up to this year's State election, the Premier committed funding to a project that will explore how the Flinders community will create a visitor economy based on Islander-identified values.

THE ISLANDER WAY

Todd Babiak, CEO of Brand Tasmania, worked with many islanders to create a Brand Story. The Brand Story paints a picture of what Islanders want. Have a close look at the Brand Story below: it represents the desire for authenticity; for retaining the Islander Lifestyle; for connectedness; and for contribution. It makes an excellent starting point for the work we will engage in soon: by 'we' I refer to Islanders and experienced consultants.

Quiet is a word you will hear a lot on Flinders Island. **The Tasmanian story is the quiet pursuit of the extraordinary, and on Flinders it is aged and distilled: quieter, harder yet more rewarding, more mysterious, more connected, more complicated, more extraordinary.**

SEPTIC TANK MAINTENANCE TIPS

A septic tank and the associated waste water disposal area, or land application area (LAA), are often forgotten about as soon as it can no longer be seen in your backyard. An onsite waste water system should function efficiently for around 10 years but there are some things you can do to get the best life out of your system.

1. Limit the amount of water you use. The less water, the less work the system has to do.
2. Ensure tree and grass roots are kept away from the LAA. Roots love to find water and block things up.
3. ENSURE grease and fat does not enter the system. Some is unavoidable (such as showering and washing greasy clothes) but don't let oil, fats or dairy (unless light yoghurt) down the kitchen sink. Wipe plates clean with paper towel and pop that in the bin.
4. Never flush sanitary items – even if they claim to be biodegradable etc
5. Check for septic friendly products; and remember:
6. Coffee grinds are great for the garden and terrible for your septic tank!

If you follow these tips, hopefully you can continue to forget about your waste water system in the back yard for a while longer!
